Humanetics Celebrates 30 Years of Manufacturing in Erie County, Ohio - Helping to Save Lives Worldwide

Humanetics' origins trace back to the 1950s, when Samuel Alderson created the first crash test dummy. Since then, the company has developed over 40 types of ATDs, ranging from newborns to large adults, including an entire suite of child and female devices. Crash test dummies were first produced in 1991 in Milan, Ohio. The operation experienced substantial growth, prompting the transition to a more expansive manufacturing site in Huron to accommodate the increasing demand.

Located in Erie County, the 45,000 square foot facility was the first of its kind, designed specifically for the manufacturing of crash test dummies. It features a state-of-the-art machining center, advanced vinyl and rubber molding systems, and a centrally located dummy certification lab spanning 4,500 square feet. The facility's advanced environmental controls ensure the production of consistent, high-quality components, setting a new standard in the industry.

As a celebration of Humanetics' 15-year presence in Huron, the company recently raised a billboard on Route 2 close to the Rye Beach Road exit. Christopher O'Connor, President and CEO of Humanetics, explains, "We wanted to remind the Huron community that the safety design of every vehicle in the world has been tested with a crash test dummy that originates in Huron. Millions of lives have been saved by these devices, meticulously manufactured here in Huron. It's hard not to be proud of

within a 7.91 square mile footprint. One of Huron's Vision 2020 Master awarded the opportunity. Plan objectives is to maximize the coastal resources.

To follow through with maximizing our coastal resources staff applied for a Coastal Management Assistance Grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources to undertake long-term improvements and connectivity planning.

The Coastal Management Assistance Grant program is a competitive annual grant opportunity offered through the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. Grants can be issued to eligible entities for water quality improvement, coastal planning, education programs, land acquisition, research, public access, habitat restoration, and other purposes.

In the fall of 2023, the City was awarded \$35,000 in funds from the Coastal Management Assistance Grant. The 1:1 matching grant money will be utilized to engage the community and stakeholders in a lakefront masterplan primarily in the vicinity of the former Showboat property westward through Lake Front Park and terminating at the public beach behind the water filtration plant. The plan will look to outline future improvements to these spaces while simultaneously planning for improved bicycle and pedestrian connections to the spaces. The City

Some of the City of Huron's greatest assets are their public parks and issued a Request for Qualifications to select the desired architectural beaches. The City is fortunate to have eight (8) designated public parks firm to lead the efforts. After reviewing several bids, OHM Advisors was

> In addition to enhancing the user experience, the implementation of nearshore habitat restoration will improve the natural environmental systems and will aesthetically enhance the historic and cultural significance of the surrounding neighborhoods. Overall, these impacts will be substantial and ultimately support the goals of the city to preserve and celebrate access to the water, foster an inclusive and diverse environment, and exemplify equity in access to its treasured waterfront amenities.

> OHM Advisors has been hired to provide certified professional services to complete a Waterfront Parks Plan. The plan will include design solutions for coastal planning, park programming connectivity, environmental nearshore enhancements, best land use recommendations, and cost/ financial feasibility analysis. Public input will be sought through Community Surveys, educational forums, and engagement opportunities

project and the South Main Street Streetscape Enhancement and Wayfinding project are coming soon to South Main Street. A combination of recent bid projects has solidified the need and desire to mainstream Main Street.

The first project, the Water Main Replacement and Resurfacing project, is taking place following a steady stream of water main breaks due to aging pipes around South Main, Forest Hills, Valley View, and Hickory Streets. Street resurfacing will take place in the Forest Hills/Valley View neighborhood. During a recent Huron City Council meeting, the Council awarded the construction contract to Spear Brothers of Sandusky. Spear Bros. came in under the engineer's estimate with the lowest bid of \$2,549,899. The project began in late spring of this year. The City will initially utilize the Ohio Water Development Authority low-interest loan program to fund the project with the annual loan payments being made by revenue from water sales.

Subsequent to completion of the Water Main/Street Resurfacing Project,

Both the South Main Street Water Main Replacement and Street Resurfacing the South Main Street Streetscape and Wayfinding Project will begin The South Main Street Streetscape Project expands South Main Street from Bogart Road to US-6. The goal of the project is to increase vehicular and pedestrian flow, expand pedestrian space and provide opportunities for businesses to enhance their outdoor amenity space. These spaces, such as patios, will visually tie into the northern portion of Main Street.

> From an aesthetic and logistic sense, the intention is to relocate utilities underground, incorporate a multi-purpose trail with landscape buffers/ bioswales, incorporate pedestrian safety enhancements for the sidewalk/ multi-use path over either side of the railroad track, extend the multi-use trail on the east side of the street from Bogart Road to Route 6, and add off-street parking with stormwater management to Standard Street. A scope meeting was held in mid-February with OHM Advisors who is the chosen architect and engineer for the project. Significant public outreach will occur in the summer, along with individualized meetings with property owners and businesses within the corridor. Construction is anticipated to occur in 2025.

the general fund and are not self-sustaining. These departments include Police, Fire, Parks & Recreation, Streets, and Stormwater. Even though these departments run very lean and efficiently, they are limited in their ability to generate departmental specific revenue to cover their operating expenses. Over the past several years, all five of these departments have continued to look for ways to further reduce costs and have significantly explored grant revenue opportunities to record levels in the city's history.

In the fall of 2023, both the Finance Committee and Huron City Council approved the 2024 budget process with the direction to staff to propose revenue enhancement opportunities. This direction was recommended to ensure the stability of operations and continuation of the level of services Huron residents expect.

In researching options to generate revenue, several important factors were considered. Staff's primary goals were to minimize the financial impact on residents and local businesses, ensure long-term stability of City operations and capital project planning and secure revenue enhancements that are flexible in how they can be used to benefit multiple departments and capital projects. Following a great deal of research and finding a means to accomplish all these goals, staff proposed the concept to increase the income tax rate from the current 1% (with no credit) to 1.75% (with a 100% credit).

This proposed income tax increase is estimated to generate an additional \$1.8M annually. Of this, \$450,000 or 25% would be paid by City residents (a result of the 100% credit), with the remaining \$1.35M or 75% paid by nonresidents. This increase would be allocated directly to operations, capital equipment, and capital projects.

Following several months of research, a thorough

The City of Huron has several departments investigation, and feedback from four wellwhich are exclusively or heavily subsidized by attended and interactive Community Public Outreach Conversations, staff presented the concept to the Finance Committee during their regularly scheduled public meeting on May 14, 2024. The Finance Committee members unanimously supported the proposal and recommended staff to present the Proposed Income Tax Increase to City Council. Once at the Council level in late June/early July, the proposal will go through the three-reading rule during open public meetings prior to being voted on. If approved by the Council, the final determination will lie within the hands of the voters as it would move to the ballot for the November election.

Officer England Completes Project Lifesaver Program



Huron Police Officer Joe England recently completed the Project Lifesaver training. Project Lifesaver is a search and rescue program operated internationally by public safety agencies.

The program is designed to help safety officials quickly locate people of all ages who are prone to the life-threatening behavior of wandering and safely return them to their families, stated Officer England.

The program is designed to combine locating technologies, search and rescue methods, and course work that educates first responders about cognitive conditions. The search times for certified Project Lifesaver agencies have been reduced from potentially hours or days, down to minutes. Recovery times for Project Lifesaver agencies average 30 minutes, which is 95% less time than standard operations without Project Lifesaver.

The program uses radio technology and specially trained search

and rescue teams. A small transmitter is worn on the wrist or ankle that emits an individualized frequency signal. If the person were to wander off, the caregiver will be notified, and a trained emergency response team may begin searching in the area where the transmitter frequency is being detected. The trained first responders will know the best techniques in approaching a person who has wandered and allow them to be brought home safely.

"As Police Chief, I wanted to be a part of a program to provide our citizens with an asset to assist any individuals who may have wandering tendencies. By having one of our officers with the proper training and equipment readily available, we can provide a timely response to save lives and reduce the potential injury for adults and children with the propensity to wander due to a cognitive condition," stated Police Chief Terry Graham.

In addition to having the skills to assist Huron residents, Officer England can assist other agencies requesting mutual aid in a search and rescue operation of an "at risk" individual.

"With the Project Lifesaver program and our recently acquired K9 unit, both will provide resources to assist with locating a missing person quickly. This approach to assist residents and their loved ones adds value to the community by giving family members peace of mind that there are services available to keep our residents safe," stated Police Chief Terry Graham.


